

Nurture Group

The Spring term's nurture group cohort have been meeting in their groups since early January. 5 children from KS1 and 6 children from KS2 come together twice a week for 45 minute sessions with Mrs Allen in the nurture room. The children have been

getting to know each other, learning to work together as a team and taking on responsibilities such as taking the snack order, laying the table and washing up.

We have been focussing on the importance of accepting our differences as well as the differences of others and learning that it's good to be us! The children have drawn up their own nurture group rules which have included be kind, never give up, help others, listen, be polite, work hard and have fun.

We have also celebrated children's mental health week and come up with ideas of how we can 'find our brave' - trying something new, putting ourselves outside of our comfort zones, asking for help and sharing our problems.
