As adult learners ourselves, how often do we step out of our comfort zone? We ask children to do that, and feel it, every day in the way we challenge them, but do we as adults practise that too? My two most recent big steps out of my comfort zone were in beginning to learn how to play the drums and how to skateboard (I know you are thinking midlife crisis'). Both of these experiences have enabled me to feel the thrill of learning a new skill, whilst providing he incredible challenge which supports growth. What will the grown-ups in our school community try to learn, which takes them beyond their comfort zone? I am sure some of you already do this. If so, well done for showing your children that we too make mistakes, and grow from them. We too get things wrong and reflect on different approaches and try again. We too feel a little less anxious each time we develop our confidence a little in a new area of learning. Thank you all for being good role-models outside school to your children by showing them that we are all learning, every day, with varying degrees of success and that resilience grows when we test it. ## Learning in Reception

What a busy half term we have had in Reception! We have enjoyed learning about "what's above me?" Though this data was last updated in 2019, it shows that whenever a child starts at our school and no matter their background, they make good progress. Progress is a more meaningful measure of a school's provision than just attainment, as this can be skewed by the ability profile of a cohort.

We have also worked very hard to improve our surroundings, including a complete revamp of the playground and a new allweather playing surface. Our next improvement is inside the small hall, as we begin to ensure that it becomes two, learning spaces, both able to be timetabled and used separately and at the same time. The plasterboard and studding arrived (in the rain) today and we are very excited about how this space will eventually be revolutionised. Work begins tomorrow! We will, once we have a partition wall, begin to use the Helen Royal Memorial Fund to make this an amazing space, which will have a brilliant impact on many young pupils. Watch this space!



## The end of an era. The beginning of a new chapter!

#### Learning in Year 2

Class 2 have been immersed in their topic Wriggle and Crawl. We have been further developing our art skills and writing for different purposes and audiences. We have also looked at the local artist, Charles Tunnicliffe, and created our own pieces of art in that style. This was entered into a competition run by Macclesfield Library. (So fingers crossed some of ours may be chosen!) During lessons in our forest we explored with our friends; looking at micro-habitats! We also progressed our cutting skills to celebrate Chinese New Year by creating a dragon. Well done Year 2!



## Learning in Year 5

This half term has involved lots of practical work in Maths and Science for Year 5: in Maths we are making scale models of the classroom furniture – this has involved plenty of careful measuring, dividing these measurements by 10 and then using various techniques to create the models out of paper. The children have really enjoyed the 'hands-on' aspect of this activity.

In Science, we have been looking at Materials and their Properties, and have planned and carried out investigations into absorbency, insulation and dissolving. I was really impressed with the children's ability to plan fair tests. Our history work has focused on 'propaganda and portraiture': a really effective activity was to see if we could identify Henry VIII in a police lineup!



Which portrait is the 'real' Henry VIII? Pupils are using what they know of images of him to make a reasoned guess.
